Wednesday, February 2, 2022 – A One Day Bus Trip from Ischgl

St. Anton and the Arlberg region are part of the largest interconnected skiing area in Austria and one of the five largest worldwide. Ski Arlberg stands for a new dimension of ski pleasure with over 10,000 feet of spectacular downhill skiing kilometers which offer winter sportsmen sheer unlimited opportunities to experience the legendary Arlberg in all its facets and to dive into a unique winter paradise. From St. Anton, St. Christoph, Stuben to Zürs and Lech and as far as Schröcken and Warth are accessible amid the impressive summits and in the wonderful valley, on- and off-piste.



St. Anton also has a very impressive snow record as well as a fast, modern lift system. Freeriders are in their element here with 200km of off-piste itineraries (marked but ungroomed pistes). The big Stanton fun park is ideal for all levels of freestyler.

St. Anton is best suited for the advanced skier. Advanced skiers will find plenty of challenging pistes as well as a huge number of exhilarating steep, ungroomed off-piste itineraries - many of which are located on the wide valluga bowl. After fresh snow it's best to hire a guide to find the best powder spots as competition is high.

Beginners will find the easier slopes at the base of the mountain. A little further up the mountain are some of the more gentle blue runs. Intermediates have a good choice of more challenging blues and reds. St. Anton is also the perfect place for confident

intermediate skiers to dip their toe into more aggressive runs, thanks to the off-piste itineraries of varying levels.



St. Anton is located in and around a pretty beautiful Tyrolean mountain village with a pedestrianized main street and family-friendly restaurants and hotels. The non-skier can take a relaxing afternoon, take a stroll to the wellness center, with indoor and outdoor pools, steam rooms, saunas, treatments, gym and range of fitness classes. There's also tobogganing, indoor and outdoor climbing at the Arl Rock Center, and lunch at the top of the Valluga.

The downside is that tentative beginners may find the terrain a little limiting as the blue runs here are more challenging than most resorts. The apres-ski scene is legendary largely thanks to the Mooserwirt and Krazy Kanguruh bars where dancing on tables in your ski boots is the norm.
